1 **WHEREAS**, Aging and Disability Resource Centers (ADRC) are the first place to go to
 2 get accurate unbiased information on all aspects of life related to aging or living with a
 3 disability; and
 4
 5 **WHEREAS**, ADRC services include providing information and assistance, options and
 6 benefits counseling, coordinating short-term services, conducting functional screens, and
 7 enrollment processing and counseling; and
 8
 9 **WHEREAS**, in Wisconsin, there are currently 34 single-county ADRCs, 12 multi-
 10 county/tribal ADRCs, and seven tribal Aging and Disability Resource Specialists that
 11 work with an ADRC; and
 12
 13 **WHEREAS**, ADRCs serve the fastest growing demographic of our state's population;
 14 and
 15
 16 **WHEREAS**, the funding method for ADRCs has not been revised in more than a decade,
 17 and funding for ADRCs has not increased since 2006; and
 18
 19 **WHEREAS**, it has become evident that ADRC funding needs revision for a number of
 20 reasons, including:
 21 • The current inequitable distribution of funding among ADRCs.
 22 • The need to increase funding so that all ADRCs may
 23 effectively meet their mission, as outlined in the Scope of
 24 Services contract addendum; and
 25
 26 **WHEREAS**, the Office for Resource Center Development (ORCD) within the
 27 Department of Health Services (DHS) established a stakeholder advisory group in 2017
 28 to discuss ADRC funding; and
 29
 30 **WHEREAS**, the stakeholder advisory group identified a number of issues with the
 31 current funding formula, such as:
 32 • Dollars are distributed based on the date of ADRC
 33 establishment - older ADRCs (Generation One) receive
 34 more funding than ADRCs established at a later date
 35 (Generation Two and Three ADRCs);
 36 • The current formula does not take into account elements
 37 associated with health and social inequity that require a
 38 greater need for ADRC services;
 39 • The current formula does not adjust with need –
 40 Wisconsin's aging and disability populations continue to
 41 grow and are expected to grow significantly over the next
 42 20 years;
 43 • The current formula does not account for needed cost of
 44 living adjustments; and
 45
 46 **WHEREAS**, a significant state GPR investment is needed to implement the
 47 recommendations of the stakeholder advisory group; and
 48
 49 **WHEREAS**, such a significant state investment would provide consistency in ADRC
 50 funding statewide, cover the services required and recommended in the Scope of Services
 51 contract addendum, and equalize services among ADRCs; and

2 **WHEREAS**, the work of the stakeholder advisory group complements the work of the
3 Governor's Task Force on Caregiving.

5 **NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED**, that the Rusk County Board of Supervisors
6 does hereby support the following increases in the 2021-23 state biennial budget to
7 ensure access to critical services provided by ADRCs to Wisconsin's aging and disability
8 populations:


- 9 • Provide an additional \$27,410,000 GPR in funding to our state's
10 ADRCs. It is important to note that the proposed change in the
11 ADRC allocation methodology cannot occur unless the full \$27.4
12 million is allocated.
- 13 • Provide additional funding to expand/equalize ADRC services
14 across the state:
 - 15 ○ Expand Dementia Care Specialist Funding Statewide:
16 \$3,320,000
 - 17 ○ Fully Fund Elder Benefit Specialists Statewide: \$2,300,000
 - 18 ○ Expand Caregiver Support and Programs: \$3,600,000
 - 19 ○ Expand Health Promotion Services: \$6,000,000
 - 20 ○ Expand Care Transition Services: \$6,000,000
 - 21 ○ Fund Aging and Disability Resources in Tribes: \$1,180,000


